
Creating health equity around the world

The power of your gift

The life-saving power of medical research

Paul Collins was only 25 when he received a confronting diagnosis of HIV. Initially filled with trepidation and terror at the thought of his life being cut short, Paul found himself at the Fairfield Infectious Diseases Hospital, seeking out support.

"I remember so vividly the early days at Fairfield Infectious Diseases Hospital: young people in the prime of their life, everywhere, all sick... Advances in HIV research since then have been astounding," Paul says.



Over three decades later, Paul proudly describes himself as 'living proof that HIV is a manageable condition.'

"I am so grateful to all those who have played an integral part in my health management, for their guidance and their belief in me," he says.

Crucial research conducted with the support of Burnet Institute has significantly improved outcomes for people living with HIV. Generous supporters have helped fund research to launch pioneering rapid HIV Testing Services, as well as novel treatments to prevent transmission of HIV, including in culturally and linguistically diverse communities.

Like so many other Australians, Paul credits his good health to life-saving advances in HIV research, including those supported by Burnet.

"With the right support and medical care, it's possible to live a full life – and accomplish goals I once never thought possible," Paul says.

But not everyone in our region has the same access to these life-saving medical interventions and treatments. Burnet is working to put them in the hands of everyone who needs them.

"I am proud to have left a gift in my Will to ensure that Burnet's research continues to change the lives of people living with HIV and AIDS worldwide. It's my way of making a contribution to their future and saying 'thank you' to all those whose work has transformed my own life."

The legacy of life

A working mother with three young children, Belinda Collins is a passionate supporter of equitable healthcare and supporting innovative research. After a personal experience with the healthcare system here in Australia, Belinda knew she had to do something.

"My eldest son, Sam, suffered complications at birth," Belinda says. "Thanks to Australia's excellent healthcare system this was a minor complication. The outcome would have been very different in many parts of the world."

With Sam healthy and well, Belinda's determination to make sure that more mothers could find the support they needed in the months before and after childbirth led her to Burnet.

"I am inspired by the work of Burnet, the dedication of its research scientists and the

vision of its management to focus on the [marginalised]," she said. "The ability to translate research in the laboratory to implementation in the field, such as the Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies program, is unique."

Between balancing caring for her children and working part-time, the opportunities to donate are limited by family budgets. These limitations led to opportunity, with Belinda choosing to leave a gift in her Will to Burnet.

Belinda's foresight means that she will increase access to the life-saving treatments that supported her and her son.

"I encourage everyone to leave a gift in their Will to Burnet – in support of the many vulnerable people whose life opportunities are considerably improved by their wonderful work."

How to make health equity your legacy

Q. Should I tell my family of my wish to leave a gift in my Will to Burnet?

Definitely. We welcome any questions your family or friends may have about our work, or how we will invest your gift when the time comes. They may like to come on a lab tour with you to see what previous gifts in Wills have made possible.

Q. Are gifts of any size accepted?

We are honoured and grateful to receive gifts of any size. Whatever kind of gift you leave, we promise it will make a tangible impact and be greatly appreciated by those whose work your gift will make possible.

Q. What type of gift has the most impact?

Any gift you feel able to leave will have a huge impact. Only 6% of Australians leave a charitable gift in their Will, so the fact that you are considering this makes you special already. One of the most beneficial gifts is a percentage of your estate which will hold value over time. We recommend speaking with your solicitor and family for the best advice.

Q. Can I leave a gift to a specific area of research?

You can, but it can make allocating funding difficult for research if a disease is cured, or a problem solved. We recommend that you let us know your wishes when you write your

Will, and we will apply your gift to the most appropriate area when the time comes. We are also more than happy to discuss this with your family.

Q. Can my gift become part of Burnet Institute's Endowment Fund?

Absolutely. Please contact our offices to discuss your considerations further.

Q. What wording do I use to draw up my Will?

There are various online Will writing facilities available, but we recommend seeking the assistance of a solicitor to draft the clause that is appropriate to you and your loved ones. The following words can be used as a guide :

"I give the sum of \$[amount]; OR [insert percentage] of my residuary estate; OR [specific assets, such as real estate, shares, artwork, etc] to the Macfarlane Burnet Institute for Medical Research and Public Health Ltd ABN 49 007 349 984 for its general purposes [OR otherwise]. I declare that the receipt of the Secretary or other proper officer for the time being of the organisation shall be a full and sufficient discharge to my executors/trustees."
