
# 2016 Results

In 2016 we conducted the *Sex, Drugs and Rock 'n' Roll* survey with young people online. We asked about their sexual behaviors, knowledge of sexually transmitted infections (STIs), alcohol and drug use, mental health and pornography use. A total of 1029 young people aged 15-29 years took part in the survey.

## **Demographics (n=1029)**

- 71% were female, 27% were male and 2% were transgender or non-binary
- 87% were born in Australia
- 63% were aged 20-29 years
- 41% had completed any post-high school education, including uni degrees and TAFE
- 90% lived in a major city
- 52% lived with their parent/s

## **Sexual identity**




## Sexual health

- 77% reported that they had ever had vaginal intercourse
- 33% reported they had ever had anal intercourse
- 83% reported they had ever given oral sex
- 82% reported they had ever received oral sex

#### Of those who reported penetrative sex in their lifetime (n=810):

- 19% reported more than 10 vaginal sex partners in their lifetime
- 6% reported more than 10 anal sex partners in their lifetime
- 42% reported a casual partner in the past 12 months
- 51% reported using condoms at last vaginal sex; 54% used the pill
- 58% reported that they had ever had an STI test

## **Knowledge of STIs**




#### Alcohol use

- 67% reported drinking alcohol for the first time when they were aged 16 years or younger
- 90% reported drinking alcohol in the past 12 months
- Of those who reported drinking alcohol, 10% reported binge drinking (six or more drinks in one sitting) more than weekly
- 29% reported that they or someone else had ever been injured because of their drinking



## **Drug use**

- 14% reported that they were current smokers
- 55% reported that they had ever used illegal drugs
- 4% had ever used crystal methamphetamine (ice)
- Of those who had ever used drugs, 42% had used in the past month



## Mental health and lifestyle

- Female participants were more likely than male participants to report a mental health problem in the last 6 months
- 65% reported that their overall mental health was excellent, very good or good.



## **Bullying**

• Of those who had been bullied in the past six months (n=191, 20%), the following types of bullying were reported:



Cyber bullying 23%



Homophobic or transphobic bullying 20%



Racial bullying 11%



Bullying at school or uni 28%



Physical bullying 19%



Workplace bullying 32%

# **Sexting**

61% reported that they had sent a sext of themselves to someone else

17% had received a sext that had been forwarded from someone else




7% had forwarded a sext of someone else to another person

65% had received a sext of someone else

## **Pornography**

Of those who had ever intentionally watched pornography (n=903, 89%):





 Male participants were more likely than female participants to report watching porn on a daily or almost daily basis (35% compared to 3%)

Some interesting answers we received to the open question 'In your view, how do you think pornography has influenced your life? (in positive and/or negative ways)':

#### **Positive**



- •"[It's helped with] understanding my own sexuality and body"
- •"It gives me pleasure"
- •"I no longer see sex as a sin"

### Neutral



- •"I don't believe porn has influenced my life at all"
- •"I suppose there is a mild enjoyment of it, with no drawback."
- •"Purely used as a means to an end and has no bearing on my day to day life."

## **Negative**



- "I think it's given casual sex partners unrealistic expectations"
- "My reliance on it to become aroused increased."
- •"[It's] made me more self conscious about my body and body hair"

## **Apps and dating websites**

- 18% of participants reported using an app or website to meet their sexual partners in the past 12 months
  - Of these, 80% used Tinder, 14% used Snapchat and 12% used Grindr



## For a bit of fun...



28% identified as a 'cat person'



56% identified as a 'dog person'



15% didn't identify as either

 'Dog people' were more likely than 'cat people' to report living alone, having post-high school education and identifying as heterosexual!
